I have noticed that I have a couple of "photographer unknown" and I will send out an email to the group to find out who it belongs too.


Once I have finished sending out the emails to the club members, I will send out a group email to let you know that I am finished.

We all have the problem of dust showing up on your sensor and making a mark on your final image. Dust spot patrol is a standard part of the processing workflow. Sometimes we miss, it's a better deal to inspect regularly and remove any stray bits you may find.

I've discovered two products which help greatly to locate and remove dust. One is The Opteka SSC-85 LED Sensor Loupe. (\$40 on Amazon) The other is a Giotto Large Rocket-Air air bulb blower. (\$10 on Amazon) There's a small Rocket-Air blower but it doesn't put out the same volume of air.

To spot the dust you turn your camera off, remove the lens exposing the sensor, turn on the LEDs on the loupe & place it over your lens opening, look through the 10x lens and find the dust. The focal length of the loupe is the distance between the lens flange and the sensor on a DSLR. To use it on a mirrorless body you'll need to lift it slightly off the lens mount to focus due to the shorter distance of a mirrorless body between sensor and lens flange. It's apparent when it's in focus, you can clearly see the pattern on the sensor surface.

If you spot dust you turn your camera lens opening down put the tip of the Rocket-Air into the sensor chamber without touching the sensor. Giving the air bulb a firm squeeze should produce a jet of air to dislodge the dust. It may be necessary to repeat the air blast. The advantage of the Rocket-Air is a valve at it's base that is designed to prevent backflow through the nozzle tip, that way you don't suck dust into the bulb to blow it back into the camera. Don't ever use canned air to blow out the camera's sensor chamber, it's easy to blow the air propellent into the chamber & coat the sensor with a film that will require professional cleaning.

If there's something that won't dislodge with the Rocket-Air repeated blasts you'll need either a special sensor brush or a wet cleaning swab. These are additional separate products. There's tutorials on the internet so you can see if you're comfortable with these procedures and want to go to the expense of acquiring these products or feel more comfortable taking your camera to a service tech & paying him to clean the sensor. If you scratch the sensor it's expensive to replace.

The products I've recommend are for simple dust removal to handle that speck that blows in when you change lenses, not for that mystery goo that appears on your sensor.







There is an area with nice vistas and wildflowers right here in Auburn. It's the Canyon View Preserve. The trail head is on the south side of the Bowman Rd exit right under the Calstar Helo pad on Lincoln Way. A white sign on a pole marks the trail head. The trail is an easy hike. The first part of the trail has a large area of Poppies and a nice bridge that leads to the rest of the area. Blue Dicks, Lupine, Fiddleneck and Popcorn Flowers and even a small area of Wild Iris's. Bear Valley is 16 miles west of Williams on highway 20. Take Bear Valley Rd north into the valley. The valley is about 20 miles or so north to south. As you enter Bear Valley Rd from highway 20 you will see a corral on the right with Tidy Tip wildflowers and a hillside with patches of Goldfields. Entering the valley from the south this year will not (at the time of this writing) show many wildflowers. Keep heading into the valley for several miles and you will come to Bear Valley Ranch on the west side of the road. It is covered with layers of wildflowers that head to the hills. Keep heading north and you will come to other pastures that are covered with flowers and a gate marked wildflower access, one of the only pastures that permit access. Poppies, Owls Clover and Fiddlenecks are by the side of the road. Coming to a junction of Bear Valley Rd, Leesville Rd and Ladoga Rd head north on Ladoga Rd. You will find meadows of Goldfields and lots of wildflowers by the roadside. Take Stonyford Rd west and you will come to fields covered with Blue Dicks, Goldfields and Poppies. See if you can find the hill side with the Elk.

The valley should be getting better in the next week or two. It's worth the drive, go slow and plan on spending the day.
