We just returned from one month in New Zealand and Australia...our "Bucket List" trip. A friend said that we should go before we turned 70, and "fell apart." Well, thanks! So we packed up and went for the month of November.

The trip was phenomenal! We spent most of our time in New Zealand, and a week on the east coast of Australia. Everything was ABOVE our expectations in NZ, and everything was just BELOW our expectations in Australia. We loved it all...except the 7.8 earthquake in Christchurch, NZ that we experienced. 
The following are my favorite photos of the 1200 that I took! Leo and I at Hobbiton, movie site of The Hobbit, on the Alexander Farm in the middle of New Zealand, Te Puia, a geothermal feature in Rotorua, Moari tribesmen at a cultural village, taking photos of waterfalls in Milford Sound off of Queenstown, NZ, and a restaurant in the depths of the Daintree Rainforest in Australia. 












No, it's not the 1870's buffalo massacre, it's using your camera out the window of a moving train.

The last 4 years I've taken Amtrak from Sacramento to Chicago for Thanksgiving. Each year I've shot images from the moving train through the windows. Through experience, and a lot of deleted images, I've developed a technique that seem to work reasonably well.

First, raise your ISO, raise your shutter speed to at least 1/1000th of a second. A faster train speed requires a faster shutter speed. Still objects close to

the train may blur. I used ISO 1600 for a 1/1000th at f5.6 in some of the shady areas, I'd get 1/2000 or 1/3000 in sunny areas. My lens was a 18-200 mm walk around lens.

Window reflections of light fixtures or other things need to be avoided in your composition or eliminated in post processing. Sit as close to the window as you can which helps eliminate reflections. If possible face forward, look forward, and if you see something to photo quickly focus on the object as you pan toward the rear following the object as it passes. The pan synchronizes the relative motion, keeping pace with the object, and makes for a sharper image.

This time of the year you get snow scenes going through the mountains, unfortunately that means low light & a higher ISO to get a high enough shutter speed to stop action. You will have a lot of noise to deal with in post processing, the images won't sustain a large enlargement for a fine print, they will be OK for smaller prints or e-mail.

The trip to Chicago takes two & a half days. It starts out eastbound by climbing the Sierra in the early afternoon on the way to Reno, it's a day trip you can take locally. It leaves Sacramento about 11 am, also can be boarded in Roseville, Colfax, or Truckee, gets to downtown Reno in the late afternoon. The return train is the next day. The complete schedule is on Amtrak.com, the train is the California Zephyr. On the full route to Chicago day 2 is a real treat. You wake up in Southern Utah around Helper or Green River and get to Denver about dinner time. It follows I70 and parallels The Colorado River for around 271 miles. It passes through the Rockies and some wonderful canyons.

If you're taking a long trip I find the more expensive bedroom is a wonderful way to travel, you have some room to move around, a private bath, and as with all sleepers the meals are included. If you want peace & quiet you can stay in your room, if you want to be with people the lounge car is a public space. The people on the train are generally there because they want to be, it's a friendly place. You do have to respect the schedule, they are serious about that. The trip does make you realize just how large and varied it is in this country, a much better impression than one gets from an airplane.







RAY IS GONE

I am so very sad to inform you that my dearest, best friend, mentor and loving companion died on Friday morning, December 9th, exactly 20 years to the day of our first meeting in art class. He was three months and seven days short of his 90th birthday. He was robbed of life after a brave and difficult, year long struggle with that evil of all afflictions, cancer!!

Raymond L.F. Johnson was a treasure not only to me, but to all who knew him. He is in fact, a designated National Treasure, as his sculpture work is archived in the Smithsonian in Washington, DC.

He was to me the only human being who truly understood, accepted and unconditionally loved me...and as many of you who know me, I can be quite a handful at times! Ray was a unique human being, and a prince among men. My nickname for him was, "Mr. Sunshine", and he lived up to that title until the day he died. Days before he died, he opened his beautiful, sparkling blue eyes, looked straight at me and with a great deal of physical effort, he smiled and tried to talk...he couldn't, but I know what he was trying to say, and tears came to his eyes. Such a heartbreak!!

As much pain as he suffered in his last days at the lovely group care home, he never complained and always showed concern for those who cared for him...always cheerful in spite of his frustration regarding the condition he found himself in toward the end of his remarkable life.

Ray was a published author; one of his books has sold copies in four countries. One of his books was turned into a stage play which ran for a month...a record for the little play-house that produced it...and was performed at a different venue three years later. Ray was also an accomplished oil painter artist as well, and many of his portraits can be found in the homes of friends and family members.

Ray worked as a draftsman and sculptor for Gladding McBean for nearly 50 years, and examples of his work can be seen in the decorative terra cotta embellishments on buildings all over America and in several foreign countries, including Japan.

So, when I say, Ray was a remarkable man, you know it is no exaggeration!

Everyone will agree that the thing, however, that made Ray most remarkable was his huge generosity of spirit, his cheerful open heartedness, and humble grace of character.

It was my honor to have known and been truly loved by, and to have in turn, loved such a wonderful, sweet and precious human being!


He was my Sunshine, my only Sunshine He made me happy when skies were gray He always knew just how much I loved him Now my Sunshine has gone away!






