What I have Learned Since Joining PCC

I joined the club in March of 2015. I still consider myself a "newbie" compared to many of the long time members of this club. I haven't had a chance to focus on improving my photographic skills until I retired in 2013, but I have been a long time enthusiast of photography since I owned my first camera, a Brownie (if you don't know what camera this is, you are younger than me). My 1st digital camera was a 1.3 MP model.

So, what I've learned:

- 1. If you wish to take good photos, take a lot of photos; some will be good, others, not so much.
- 2. Focus is very important, especially if you are shooting a wildlife subject. The eye of the subject must always be sharp.
- 3. You may take a very good photo, but if it is not cropped perfectly, it will be less than perfect. **This** is probably one of the most important things I've learned.
- 4. If your background sky is too light, or just boring (pure blue, or grey monotone clouds it lessens the impact of your photo.) This can be addressed to some degree in post processing.
- 5. Depth of field is very important. If you are focused on a single subject, in most cases, the background should be out of focus; set your f-stop appropriately. Also, a bright and/or complex background will detract from the primary subject.
- 6. When taking a shot, try different positions or angles on the subject. Move left, right, up, down, until you achieve the best composition including subject and background.
- 7. Get used to using aperture, shutter, and manual modes of your camera and the reasons why each mode may be the best to use in a given situation.
- 8. To some degree, a perfect shot is a mix of applying your skillset, good luck, being in the right place at the right time, or just spending a lot of time in a given location waiting for the right moment. In some cases, this takes patience, perseverance, and planning (for the right time of day and lighting).
- 9. Post processing is an art which must be practiced and improved on a regular basis.
- 10. Don't be afraid to have your photos critiqued by experienced photographers. You will learn something new almost every time and this will improve your photography skillset.
- 11. To improve your photographic skills, expend energy in this pursuit. Do whatever it takes, including asking the advice of fellow photographers, participating in photo critiques (of your own photos, or listening to critiques of others photos), taking online classes, etc. Last but not least, keep on taking photos and experiment with different photo composition styles.
- 12. I have a lot more to learn.

Jim & Shirley's Secret Photo Locations

This is the first of a series of articles I propose to write telling everyone exactly where you can go to replicate the photos attached to this article. In other words, we are revealing some of our secret photo locations. Here are new places for you to go to get great photos, summer and sometimes in the winter. Often times you can shoot from or near your car.

Casa Loma road near Alta: Go east on I80 above Auburn and take the Alta off ramp. Turn hard right at the stop sign and then left on the Casa Loma Rd. In about ¼ mile go to the right on the road that goes down the hill and crosses Canyon Creek. It is one way crossing the creek. In summer you can follow this road across the first RR track crossing down to the 2nd RR track where you turn right across the tracks and go out to Iron Point. Vast views of the N. fork of the American river canyon looking down into Giant Gap. In winter with snow on the road, with a 4x4 you often can go to the 2nd RR crossing and turn around and return to I80. This portion of the road is plowed some days. Look for the Blue Canyon deer herd in the winter, trains, and snow on the black oak trees. There are often low clouds in Giant Gap after a storm. In the summer we use our Suburu and in the winter a 4x4 is safer. After crossing the 2nd RR track look for a high peak 25 yards from the road on your right, pull off to the right, park and walk up the jeep trail to the peak. Great views of Giant Gap from this location, which is called Iron Point. Just down the road from here 100 yards is a public out-house at the head of the Eucher Bar trail that goes down to the river. Going down this trail and back is an all day trip for someone who is young and strong. Rafters haul there rafts down this trail in the summer. Drive slow on this road and use extra care. It is steep country!


