Coming to Gallery 1855 this week...the work of Jerry Berry!

Well over one hundred years ago, photographic fine art was concerned with trying to marry Impressionism with Neo-Romantic paintings. Dreamy, soft focus landscapes, or moody tableaux representing Victorian sentimentality, were quite common. In the early part of the 20th century, a gritty social realism swept through the medium. While not intended to be fine art at the time, the change in sensibility gave rise to the next generation of photographers.

This next generation did intend to make art, using photography for the inherent capabilities of that medium: namely the ability to present visual documents of the world around us. They showcased an artistic sensibility characterized by their choice to document that which had both social significance and, much more importantly, aesthetic and metaphoric significance.

But there was another movement, much less recognized at the time. This second movement was pushing the technical boundaries of the medium in order to make images less about the apparent reality of the world and more about the magic that was possible. In this tradition, Jerry Berry's current work is much more about magic than realism. Berry has the unique ability to see the world, not for what it is but, rather, for what it might be. Berry's work thus transforms natural landscape into mystery and wonder.

A MOST REMARKABLE WILDLIFE EXPERIENCE

With both arms full of bags of groceries, I stumbled down our breezeway to the sliding patio door. I slammed open the sliding screen with a bang and out of the corner of my eye, I saw this very large, beautiful, orange breasted hawk, leap from the manzanita perchement to our Goldfinch feeder, ten feet from where I stood. Not only did I see the frantic flapping of the Red Shoulder hawk's wings, but in the background, two feet away from the hawk, were a dozen Goldfinches escaping from their sock thistle feeder. Could it be that the hawk had been sitting on the perch 2 feet away from the Goldfinches, watching them feed? And if so, why were the goldfinches continuing to feed with that giant hawk only two feet away?

I yelled at Shirley my wife about what had happened and she pointed out to me that the hawk had landed on the limb of my neighbor's tree only 30 feet away. What is going on? I ran for my camera, installed the 80-400mm lens, flash

and flash extender to help overcome the intense back- lighting of the late afternoon sun.

I crept to the edge of the deck, trying to get an unobstructed view of the hawk. I fired a few shots and retreated to a spot on the deck where I was somewhat concealed from the hawk by some limbs of our live oak tree. I later discovered that in my excitement I had not check my settings and been shooting at f 10 at 1/60th of a second. Not good! I did brace the heavy lens on the rail of the deck and with the help of the VR in the lens was able to get the attached shot of the hawk.

Out of no-where dove another smaller Red-Shouldered hawk that passed under the hawk in the tree and then landed on a fence some distance away. We had seen the two hawks around our place, calling out and asserting their territory during the past two weeks and on one occasion landing in one of our other trees, where I did get some good shots of the bird.



suddenly I saw the smaller of the two hawks swoop in from behind the larger hawk I was watching, mount her and start copulating. I ran for the corner of the deck, took aim at the pair of hawks and could not find them in the viewfinder. Quickly, removing my eye from the camera I saw their actions were continuing. I looked thru the viewfinder again but just could not find them in the viewfinder. It was over in less that a minute and I had missed a great wildlife shot.

I was up at 6 AM the next morning, got the paper, glanced up into the trees behind the house and there she was again. The saga continues.

Howdy Folks!



WHAT JUDGES LOOK FOR IN PHOTOS

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

- (1) A photo out of focus, either the whole photo or part of it in an important location such as the bottom front of the print.
- (2) Too much "clutter" in the picture. We want our attention to go directly to the subject, not see a lot of competing, but not necessary, clutter around it.
- (3) Exposure is the picture too light or too dark to easily see the subject.
- (4) Poor lighting, a "flat" image where rocks, subject, sky, etc., all blend together without different shadows, colors, etc. or the opposite where the sun might bleach out the lighter parts of the image, giving no texture to those areas.

There are other more subtle criteria we look for; placement of the subject, size of the subject within the image, etc., but the 4 listed above are the first and foremost most commonly seen, easily correctable problems that usually cause a photo to be eliminated.
