Labeling Your Nature Images; What's in a label?

Keep in mind, in Nature Photo Competition, the story telling aspects of the image are most important. How you name or label your nature image can make your image a big success or a dismal failure. A picture is worth a thousand words. A good label is worth 1 to 3 points!

Here are some helpful hints for labeling your nature image:

- 1. Try to correctly **identify your subject**.(eg. plant, animal, geological feature, atmosphere feature, ecological feature)
- 2. Try to keep your label **short & specific**.
- 3. Try to label the **most important** "story telling" part of your image.
- 4. Some <u>descriptive Behavioral Traits</u> to keep in mind: Breeding, Mating, Preening, Warning, Digging, Nesting, Nursing, Hiding, Camouflage, Feigning, Emerging, Displaying, Fighting, Nest Building, Drinking, Eating, Feeding Young, Hatching, Parasitic, Saprophytic, Running, Crawling, Hibernate, Estivate.
- 5. Some <u>descriptive Geographical Data</u> to keep in mind: Volcanic, Marine, Desert, Forest, Fresh Water, Thermal Pools, Earthquake, Ice, Snow, Altitude, Hot, Cold, Mineral, Igneous, Sedimentary, Metamorphic, River, Swamp, Specific Location.
- 6. Some <u>descriptive Anatomical Data</u> to keep in mind: Proboscis, Appendages, Leg, Eyes, Wings, Exoskeleton, Fur, Antlers, Shell, Fins, Gills, Claws, Skin, Bones, Horns, Tail, Colors, Sex, Teeth, Thorax, Abdomen, Neck, Anthers, Stamens, Pistils, Leaves, Petals, Buds,
- 7. Some <u>descriptive Ecological Data</u> to keep in mind: Predator, Prey, Parasite, Competitor, Disease, Insectivore, Carnivore, Herbivore, Autotrophic,
- 8. Some <u>Habitats</u> to keep in mind when labeling your nature image: Fresh Water, Swamp, River, Marine, Riparian, Desert, Forest, Soil, Arctic, Plains, Tundra.

Please, no "cutesy" type of labels for your nature images!



WHAT JUDGES LOOK FOR IN PHOTOS

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

- (1) A photo out of focus, either the whole photo or part of it in an important location such as the bottom front of the print.
- (2) Too much "clutter" in the picture. We want our attention to go directly to the subject, not see a lot of competing, but not necessary, clutter around it.
- (3) Exposure is the picture too light or too dark to easily see the subject.
- (4) Poor lighting, a "flat" image where rocks, subject, sky, etc., all blend together without different shadows, colors, etc. or the opposite where the sun might bleach out the lighter parts of the image, giving no texture to those areas.

There are other more subtle criteria we look for; placement of the subject, size of the subject within the image, etc., but the 4 listed above are the first and foremost most commonly seen, easily correctable problems that usually cause a photo to be eliminated.
