Spring Wildflower Potential

The below note appeared on the CalPhoto Yahoo Group page on 12/2. If you're contemplating a possible Desert or Southern CA wildflower trip this spring now is the time to watch the rains down in that area. Generally speaking an inch of rain in the dry areas of the state in December and again in January mean there will be a good wildflower bloom later in the Spring. The rains set the dormant seeds to growing. The more rain & the later the rain may mean more variety of flowers. Some only pop up every few years depending on if the mix of rain & sun is to their liking.

From CalPhoto:

"Current most welcome Pacific storm is doing wonders to droughty regions of our state, especially areas to the south that have pretty much been left out by any of the minor north state rains since the one good storm we had in late September. The Southern Sierra is also doing well while the Tahoe region mostly bare of snow before this week has just seen pidly rains with a high snow level. Storm has yet to reach much of Mojave and areas south of LA.

Some of the usual spring wildflower areas are getting a soaking with more to come over the next few days. Carrizo already up to 2/3 inch, Cottonwood 4/10, Figueroa Mtn, CA State Antelope Valley Poppy Preserve, and Gorman all OVEr an inch, Saddleback Butte, Red Rock 1/3, Indian Wells and Walker Pass well over an inch, Isabella Dam 2 1/4 inches, and even Death Valley mountain remote gauges are up over 3/4 inch. The kind of winter storm that gets seed and root clocks ticking."

The particularly encouraging news is for Carrizo Plain, The State Poppy Reserve near Lancaster in The Antelope Valley, and Gorman.

Keep your fingers crossed for more rain in these areas (and our own too).

Fun with Fisheye

The first time I used a fisheye lens was in Arches National Park in February 2014 while participating in a photography workshop hosted by Moose Peterson and Kevin Dobler. One of my fellow participants insisted I try his 16.0mm f/2.8 lens while we were perched precariously on a ledge looking up at Twin Arches. I captured this shot and learned my first lesson about fisheye lenses. They have a very wide angle of view. I managed to get the hand, arm, and lens of another photographer in my photograph (right). This unwanted element of the photograph disappeared once I cropped to 8X10 but it was a valuable lesson.



In October, I bought my own fisheye lens at Action Camera. I decided to get a DX version of the lens, a 10.5mm f/2.8 lens, because I own a Nikon D7100, a crop sensor camera, as well as my full frame Nikon D800. What I love about this lens is that I can make something ordinary look rather extraordinary. And, as long as I pay attention to the composition, I can avoid unwanted extras like feet and body parts of people standing nearby.




I first took it to the California Railroad Museum's Trains and Tripod October event and discovered that I could take some very interesting shots. I just love the look of this Santa Fe engine. It looks more like a Christmas ornament that an engine. I suppose railroad aficionados might not approve but I think it's unique.



When I had the unexpected opportunity to visit France in November, I knew I would be taking my fisheye lens with me, even though I opted to carry minimal camera equipment and took only one body (my D800) and one other lens (28-300mm)




