

Question of the Month

This month's question is 'How Do You Scan'?

Quite a few of us have film slides that we would like to scan to take advantage of the digital darkroom.

I have an old Epson flatbed scanner that has the upper lid light to scan slides. This scanner is about 7 years old and needs to be replaced; current technology has far surpassed it.

Whether you use a dedicated film scanner or a flatbed scanner for slides, the important thing to remember is to scan at the scanner's highest optical resolution. By doing this you can then use the output for any number of things, instead of having to re-scan at a higher resolution later for a different type of output.

Dmax (dynamic range) and optical (not digital) resolution are two important spec's to look at when considering a scanner.

How do you scan? Do you have a film or flatbed scanner? Scanner software that you like? Do you send your slides out to be scanned?

Let me know and I will print the responses in next month's column.

A Photo Fun Day



The first Saturday in July this year was a Photo Fun Day for sure. Oatmeal and raisin pancakes with cold applesauce on top at Sweetpeas in Auburn started the day. Then the drive up highway 20, east of Nevada City about 6 miles to the Washington Conservation Camp turn off. Turning left on that road about 1 mile and then left on the road to the Rock Creek Nature Trail. Two miles down that road took us down into the canyon and the parking lot.

The ¾-mile loop- trail is mostly cool, shady, and level. It reminded me of a walk in the rainforest Redwoods of the north coast. Rock Creek, a tiny little thing that ripples and bubbles along thru moss covered rocks and trees. It was very quiet, except for the many chirps of baby birds in their nests. We often walk this trail to photograph the billions of ladybugs that cover the moss-covered logs in the late winter. We were too late this day for the ladybugs since they had left early this year. We were also too early for the many species of wild Orchids, Tiger Lilies and other wild flowers. They will show themselves next month in August. The huge specimens of Pacific Yew, Douglas-fir, Ponderosa Pines and Madrone along with California Hazelnut and three species of dogwood made our day. It was amazing to just sit on one of the many resting benches and listen to the rushing of the creek.


After our hike a quick trip up highway 20 and turn left down to the old gold mining town of Washington on the higher than normal South Fork of the Yuba River. Cold turkey sandwiches and an ice cold drink on the back porch of the old Washington Hotel with the incredible views of the river, and the many sparsely clad bathers. The town of Washington with a population of 161(except in the winter) is a mecca for gold-rush photographers. After lunch we hiked down the very steep steps behind the hotel thru a most wonderful garden of Foxglove, Lavender, succulents and ferns to the river. A view back up above to the hotel's back porch with the foreground of all the flowers was breathtaking. Hiking up the steps we wandered over to look at the old mining and wagon relics hanging on the walls of the wooden fence. The 150 year old building next door could have been in Bodie, but here it was just a short drive from Auburn.


SAFARI WEST

I recommend it!







No dust! Beautiful spot, 400 rolling acres subdivided into separate "pastures" for different critters with 3 large lakes.



to Africa!





WHAT JUDGES LOOK FOR IN PHOTOS

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

You're probably wondering why we pick one image over another; there actually are some simple rules of photography we look for in each photo. Common mistakes are:

- (1) A photo out of focus, either the whole photo or part of it in an important location such as the bottom front of the print.
- (2) Too much "clutter" in the picture. We want our attention to go directly to the subject, not see a lot of competing, but not necessary, clutter around it.
- (3) Exposure is the picture too light or too dark to easily see the subject.
- (4) Poor lighting, a "flat" image where rocks, subject, sky, etc., all blend together without different shadows, colors, etc. or the opposite where the sun might bleach out the lighter parts of the image, giving no texture to those areas.

There are other more subtle criteria we look for; placement of the subject, size of the subject within the image, etc., but the 4 listed above are the first and foremost most commonly seen, easily correctable problems that usually cause a photo to be eliminated.

We have meetings the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 at the Beecher Room in the Library off Nevada Street.
