

We spent quite a bit of time in Photoshop Elements and Adobe Light room when we returned home from the shoot..





Shooting Up-Country.

Too early for the high-country, so let's go shooting "up-country", the 5000 plus elevation of Placer County's French Meadows. Last week we traveled thru the thousand foot high canyons of the Middle Fork of the American River to the French Meadows reservoir on our annual early spring search for wildlife, mountain flowers and to see what the winter snows have done to our mid-mountain playgrounds.

The canyon walls on the way up were festooned to the top with yellow bush Monkey Flowers which we just had to stop and grab a shot or two. After crossing the dam and turning left for the campgrounds, a coyote trotted across the road in front of us, his winter coat still thick and dark. In the next two miles from the boat launch to the river crossing I figure we have a one —in —four chance of seeing a bear. I know of no other place where just driving along on a paved road in the mountains where about 25% of the time you will have a California Black Bear cross in front of you. Yep…there he is….but his is a shaggy yellow-white, has not lost his adolescent winter coat yet. We jump out and creep as close as we dare, but he just won't pose without all those branches over his face. A few shots and we decide to check out Chipmunk Ridge.

This road off to the right is a little rough and 11 miles over to Hell Hole reservoir but the first mile of this road has the best flowering Dogwood display in the Sierra, as far as I can find. The Subaru Outback takes it slow but safely the 3 miles up to the top of the ridge. I had just told Shirley my wife to keep a good lookout for the migrating deer herd that uses this ridge as a route, when we popped over the top to stare at two does and a small buck who wonder who we are. Shirley shoots like crazy out of the car window, but I have food on my mind and one of the best lunch spots in the Sierra is only one-hundred yards up the ridge. Lunch from this spot is time deducted from worldly cares, as the view north reveals all the high peaks of the Donner Pass, and the views down to the lake 800 feet below are superb. We travel down towards Hell Hole on the remainder of the paved road it was, only to find a mountain side of flowering purple-blue Phlox, just before the Hell Hole road and our way home. I know I have left out a lot we saw on that day trip, just so when you take this drive you will have some surprises to see too.




Lower French Meadows Reservoir.





Upper French Meadows Reservoir.





Camera Stuff - My reason for selling this gear is that I have moved to a larger format camera. If I have not sold the equipment, I will bring it to the next meeting.

Lens - Nikon Auto Focus. 70-300mm f4.5-5.6. It does not have the VR (Vibration Reduction). The new version of this lens came out with VR, and the price went up a couple of hundred dollars. Mine since new. Lens hood. Front and Rear Cover. **\$120**

Lens - Nikon Auto Focus 18-200mm 3.5-5.6mm G ED VR lens. If you want only one lens for your camera, this is it. It has been mine since new, and I have cared for it. Lns hood, front and rear cover. Practically everyone with a Nikon digital camera also has this lens. It is a classic. I should call it like new as I can find no marks, scratches or other disfigures on the lens, but I will rate it

excellent. Mine since new. \$575 (\$849 Amazon)



Lens - Sigma. 150 - 500mm. 5-6.3 APO HSM. Optical Stabilizer. This one I can really call new. I made the dumb decision to buy it, and then went to a large format camera. It is a large beautiful lens. The lens is fitted with a tripod arm. It was made in Japan by Sigma, a lens maker that usually meets, and sometimes exceeds Nikon lenses. This lens comes with a padded canvas carrying case. It has front and rear covers, and a lens hood. Original box. If you like shooting athletics or wildlife, this is it. My loss is your gain. **\$650** (Amazon \$1,069)

Confessions of an Amatuer Photographer.

Here are some easy to make faux pas you can execute in your pursuit of photo-nirvana. Not for the rank amateur, these are at a threshold above the "I forgot to recharge my battery" and the "I left the memory card in my pc" situations. As a bonus, I have included some remedies that may spoil your first-hand experience with these beauties. I claim personal first hand experience with developing this inventory.

1. This 12 seconds of beeping is brought to you by you

Ever set-up a shot with a 12 second delay so you can get into the photo? Then you forget to reset and find that your next action shot occurs with 12 seconds of a beeping countdown! Rumor has it that some professionals aspire to this one.

Here's a couple ways to respond to such: Wait for camera makers to make a camera that resets itself on the next photo or that verbally announces "do you really want a 12 second delay?". Pretend that this is part of your perfection of setting up a shot and that you are doing this on purpose.

2. Why am I getting so many photographs on this SD card?

Ever adjust your image setting for a lower resolution because you are just taking a photograph of some info you need, like a marquee with show times - why go 10 pixels when 2 or 3 would suffice and you won't waste memory? Then you forgot to reset and find that on day 8 of your trip that you have a bunch of 2 mega pixels shots!

Response: Don't even think of doing this. Wait for camera makers to build verbal responses that warn you that "this feature was an afterthought".

3. It is so bright out here, I can't review captures or previews on my LCD.

So, you are in the high desert, maybe Utah which bills itself as "Life Elevated" and you can agree without the aid of drugs or religion that your LCD is just blurred out like - Photo A below.

You may not be able to rely on automatic settings in this harsh and contrasting environment.

Try resetting your preview function to show curves like - Photo B below. At least with this view you can check your curves to see if your exposure is correct. Or, maybe just crawl back into your cave and wait for dusk.

4. When you are on the road and you show up to the local library to do some Internet and catch-up on events at 10am (the time that displays on your camera), their opening hour, they refuse to do so for another hour.

Any trip to Four Corners will catch you on this one as Arizona is kinda like in a "zona" by themselves (no daylight saved there). The 'retentive' will be consumed by border crossings and appropriate time adjustment on their cameras in this part of the USA. Response: Wait for camera makers to incorporate a GPS based system for time zone corrections. Forget time of photograph imprinting. Bribe the librarian.

5. If you are going to the great south west (Nevada, Utah and Arizona), it is not as leisurely a trip as it may seem.

It is a shame to travel to this area and come back with photographs that suffered from the high noon look.


Plan your trip to be at your highlight areas at dusk and or dawn. Pray for clouds like this one I got of the eclipse on my way back from my recent trip to the south west like Photo C below.

A Trip to Audubon Ranch.

The beginning of June I had the pleasure to visit Audubon Canyon Ranch in the Bolinas Lagoon area of Marin County. The canyon is a well known Egret nesting site that allows public viewing of the nesting birds and their chicks. This year marked a change, in that the birds moved to a different group of trees in the canyon. As a result, the nests are farther from the viewing area and more challenging to capture detailed images. The Audubon website gives updates as to the progress of the nests, as the chicks have just recently hatched, and will be growing in size and activity (http://www.egret.org/node/928).

The panorama type photo of several nests was taken from this viewing area, with a 600mm focal length lens on a crop sensor camera from a distance of 200+ yards. The image quality was reduced due to atmospheric distortion as the warm afternoon air rose in the canyon. This view was better with binoculars, and provided the best perspective down upon the nests. I spent about 60 minutes at the viewing platform watching and listening to the birds across the canyon.

After walking back down to the visitor's center, I observed the Egrets from behind the buildings, looking up at from ground level. This view was closer and greatly reduced the atmospheric distortion. From this perspective I got some lovely photos of the Egrets flying to and from their nests bringing sticks to their mates.

This was my first visit to this site since my childhood. I would highly recommend a visit, perhaps as part of a weekend in the Point Reyes National Seashore. We are fortunate to have this unique gem within a days drive of our community.


