This months meeting will be Tuesday, May 16, 2006 at 7:00 PM.



This month is our May competition. The judge will be Truman Holtzclaw. Truman will give a short 20 minute presentation that will be followed by the competition. Truman is bringing a digital projector for his presentation so we will have access to that for the competition.

This month we will have 2 entries per category instead of 4. That is in all categories including prints. Projected media

entries are combined so you can have a total of 2 entries in each category, for instance one slide and one digital entry in each category, Nature, Pictorial, P.J., Travel and Artistically Enhanced. The 3 print categories of Color, Monochrome and Artistically Enhanced you can have 2 entries in each.

For this competition we will be trying a different format. We will no longer read the name of the artist. Names of artists who received a score of 12 will be read at the end of the competition.

If you are new to the club and haven't entered a competition now is the time! Having a photo judged can be a good way to learn what is good and what can be improved in a photo.

Shooting Wildflowers

This time of year many of us are out shooting wildflowers. The first few times I shot wildflowers in bright sunlight I was disappointed with what my camera captured. That's not what I saw! The human eye has a much bigger dynamic range than a camera weather film or digital. Cameras can capture 5 to 6 stops of light whereas the human eye can process 12 plus. This is where diffused light comes in. Many of us have found out that bright overcast days are great for shooting wildflowers. The cloud cover creates diffused light rather than direct light. On cloudless sunlit days this is where a diffuser comes in. Diffusers come is various sizes. Typically 12 – 36 inches or even bigger. A diffuser is a porous piece of cloth that diffuses the light to spread it evenly eliminating shadows and softening highlights. It reduces the difference in stops of light between the highlights and the shadows to a value your camera can capture. What can be used in addition to a diffuser is a reflector. Both are lightweight and usually fold to a small package to fit in your bag. To use a diffuser position so it the sunlight filters through it onto the subject. Hold it close to the subject. Holding it too far away will cast a shadow. At this point if needed you can use a reflector to redirect some soft light onto the subject. Reflectors come in various colors, typically shades of gold or silver but can be made of any color you wish. Each will cast a different color or temperature of light. A reflector can also be made of any reflective material. Crumple it up and place it over a surface such as cardboard. For best results use a tripod and a remote shutter release.

The two Iris photos here are an example of what a diffuser will do. Notice the harsh light on the Iris without the diffuser and the even light on the Iris with the diffuser.

Both were taken on a tripod and the only difference is the use of a diffuser.

Here is the way Our Competitions Work

Basically we have two divisions, projected media and pints. Projected media is divided into digital and slides. For projected media we have five categories, Nature, Travel, Photo Journalism, Pictorial and Artistically Enhanced. For prints we have Color, Monochrome and Artistically Enhanced. You can enter all of the categories but you can only enter two entries in each. For projected media this means a total of two in slides and digital. So if you have one Nature slide and one Nature digital entry that would be two. For prints it's two in each category. Please see Judy Hooper before the competition to register your print or slide. This needs to be done because we are no longer reading the name of the artist. For prints the only mounting requirement is that it be able to stand up in our vertical light box.

For digital entries burn them to a cd and give them to me before the meeting so I can preload them on my laptop. For digital specific information see the very end of the newsletter.

Placer Camera Club Definitions of Photo Competition Categories

Projected Media

Nature

This category is the story of nature and the hand of man should not be seen. Nature photography is restricted to all branches of natural history except anthropology and archeology. The subject should be presented in a fashion that is identifiable and able to certify to its honest presentation. The story telling value of the subject will be weighed more than the pictorial quality. The human element shall not be present. Photos of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation that alters the truth of the photographic statement.

Travel

A travel photograph must express the feeling of a time and place, portray a land, its people or culture in its natural state, and has no geographical limitations. Ultra close-ups

which lose their identity, studio type model shots or photographic manipulations which misrepresent the true situation or alter the content of the image are unacceptable.

Photo Journalism

Photojournalism shall consist of pictures with informative content and emotional impact, including human interest, documentary and spot news. The journalistic value of the photograph shall be considered over pictorial quality. In the interest of credibility, photographs which misrepresent the truth, such as manipulation to alter the subject matter or situations which are set up for the purpose of photography are unacceptable.

Pictorial

The pictorial category has no limitation on subject matter. This is a catch all category. If your photo does not fit the other categories this is where it goes. Strong emphasis is placed on composition, lighting and impact. Any form of manipulation which alters the truth of the photographic statement is unacceptable.

Artistically Enhanced

The artistically enhanced category is for photos that have been manipulated beyond the basic tenants of brightness, contrast, levels, sharpening and basic color adjustment. In this category anything goes as far as manipulation. Photos will be judged on impact, composition and quality of the manipulation.

Prints

Color Print

The color print category has no limit on subject matter but any form of manipulation which alters the truth of the photographic statement is unacceptable. Mounting or matting of prints is recommended.

Monochrome Print

Both sepia and black & white prints belong in this category. Emphasis is placed on composition and lighting. Any form of manipulation which alters the truth of the photographic statement is unacceptable. Mounting or matting of prints is recommended.

Artistically Enhanced Print

The artistically enhanced category is for photos that have been manipulated beyond the basic tenants of brightness, contrast, levels, sharpening and basic color adjustment. In this

category anything goes as far as manipulation. Photos will be judged on impact, composition and quality of the manipulation.

Competition Guidelines

In all categories each image will stand on its own merit for judging purposes. Titles will be read for all photographs in all categories.

In all categories except the three print categories slides and digital media are acceptable. Slides will be projected and digital media will be shown on a notebook computer or digital projector if available.

In all categories except the two Artistically Enhanced categories only basic adjustments are allowed. This includes cropping, brightness, contrast, levels, basic color adjustment and sharpening. Advanced manipulation such as addition or removal of individual objects is not allowed.

For the **Print** categories place a **label** on the back of your print with your name, category, and title of the work. We are working to standardize the labeling format with other clubs so more on this later.

The **digital** entries should be in **jpeg** (jpg) format. **Name** each entry with the initials of the category being entered followed by a dash then the name of the entry followed by a dash then your first and last name initials. For example if I was entering a picture named house in P.J. it would be named as follows **pj-house-ms.jpg** Entries should be sized to 1024 x 768 for landscape and 768 x 1024 for vertical or as close as aspect ratio will allow. This will help me a great deal when I present them for the judge. During competition I won't have time to sort through your files for you. We are working on standardizing digital image entry format with other clubs so we are all on the same page. More on this later as details emerge.
