Refreshment Committee Needs Goodies





A few months ago, when I began to take macro shots with my new 105mm macro lens, I discovered that the depth of field was so shallow that I could get only a very small area of the photograph in focus. Even exposing with the smallest aperture resulted in only a slightly larger in focus area in my shots, especially if I was shooting very close up. I had to decide which tiny part of the photograph I wanted to focus on and I was rarely able to get as much of the photo in focus as I wanted.

Enter "focus stacking." I first heard about focus stacking before I bought my macro lens but paid no attention to it. Then I took a macro class at Action Camera in Roseville and Pete Perez, the instructor for that class, showed us a focus stacked image which he had created from, as I recall, 27 images. It was a bunch of gears, probably a pocket watch or something, but the photograph was in focus from edge to edge. I was impressed. Focus stacking was obviously the answer to my dilemma but, although there are lots of software options available to do it, I didn't really want to buy more software that I would have to learn just for those rare times when I felt focus stacking was needed.

Then, the first "rare time" presented itself. I used my macro lens to photograph a flower but was unable to get all the parts of the flower in focus. I wondered if Photoshop had a Focus Stacking feature. I use Lightroom to process my photos but I occasionally edit them in Photoshop for those effects unavailable in Lightroom. A Google search came up with a video showing an easy way to focus stack images in Photoshop. The video was only about 3 minutes long and, after viewing it, I realized I could do it without buying extra software.

I took ten shots of the flower, focusing on a different area in each shot. Then, I followed the simple steps to achieve a blended, totally focused shot. You can achieve the same thing by following these simple steps:

- 1) In Lightroom, select all of the photographs to be combined into the final.
- 2) Go to 'Edit in' under the Photo Menu and at the bottom of the drop down menu, select 'Open as Layers in Photoshop....'
- 3) When the photos have been exported to Photoshop, select all of the newly created layers.
- 4) Go to the Edit Menu and select 'Auto Align layers.' This will make sure all the shots are perfectly aligned; even if using a tripod, every time you touch the camera to focus on a different area there might be slight movement.
- 5) After the photos are aligned, go to the Edit Menu again and select 'Auto Blend Layers.'
- 6) Save and return to Lightroom.

That's it. It takes mere minutes and you have a perfectly blended image in focus from edge to edge. Here are my results, with two of the ten images I used showing the stamen in focus in one and out of focus in the other and the rear petal in focus in one and out of focus in the other. Everything is in focus in the final blended image.



Camera Settings
They were all taken at:

Focal Length 105mm ISO 100 f/22



A few years ago Shirley and I traveled to Churchill, Manitoba, Canada to take a week long class on Polar Bears. We were housed out of town several miles in an old rocket testing facility where we had daily classes on Polar Bears by renowned experts from all over the world. We saw slide and video presentations and heard lectures, traveled the tundra nearby to see and photograph bears using Tundra Buggies, helicopters and dog sleds. It was a great class but very confining since we were not permitted to leave the building un-less we were accompanied by a person with a shotgun to protect us from bears that were all over the place. This group of bears waits each fall in and around Churchill for the water of the nearby Hudson Bay to freeze so they can spend the winter hunting seals on the frozen ocean north of there.


I bring this to your attention now since we are now watching those same bears each day on my computer from the warmth of our home. It is 3 degrees below zero today at Churchill! The live video cams are mounted on the Tundra Buggies which move around the area photographing and viewing the bears. You may wish to go on one of the Tundra Buggies tours yourself and you can look up this information using your computer and Google. One very large group of Tundra Buggies has been turned into a "hotel" where you can spend several days at the site. In the mean time you can view the bears from a buggy mounted video cam at "http://www.alaskapublic.org/2014/11/03/live-video-the-annual-polar-bear-migration-in-churchill-manitoba/ You should attempt to watch the bear in the middle of the day since is gets dark in Churchill early. There are technical problems from time to time....it is a live feed, so if it does not work your first time ,try again. If you want more information of what could be a photo trip of a lifetime, talk to us in person.


